Government financing:

As per the original PAM (version 22 May 2018), the Government would finance: (i) government counterpart staff salaries and office space (in-kind); and (ii) land acquisition and resettlement (LAR) (in-cash). On 24 August 2020 the Ministry of Finance requested ADB to approve financing land acquisition and resettlement (LAR) costs from the grant proceeds, instead of government's counterpart funds. The justification for this request was fiscal constraints due to the COVID-19 pandemic, during which the government has been experiencing challenges meeting its revenue tay – I argets, and budget has been reallocated for the emergency COVID-19 pandemic response and recovery. These constraints are impeding the government's ability to make available and thus timely disburse the required LAR compensation payments to the project's financing plan to facilitate this, reducing government's counterpart funding from \$1.8 million (3.7% of total project costs) to \$1.68 million (3.5% of total project costs), and consequently, reducing the total project cost from \$48.8 million to \$48.68 million. This change is reflected in the updated PAM of 30 April 2021.

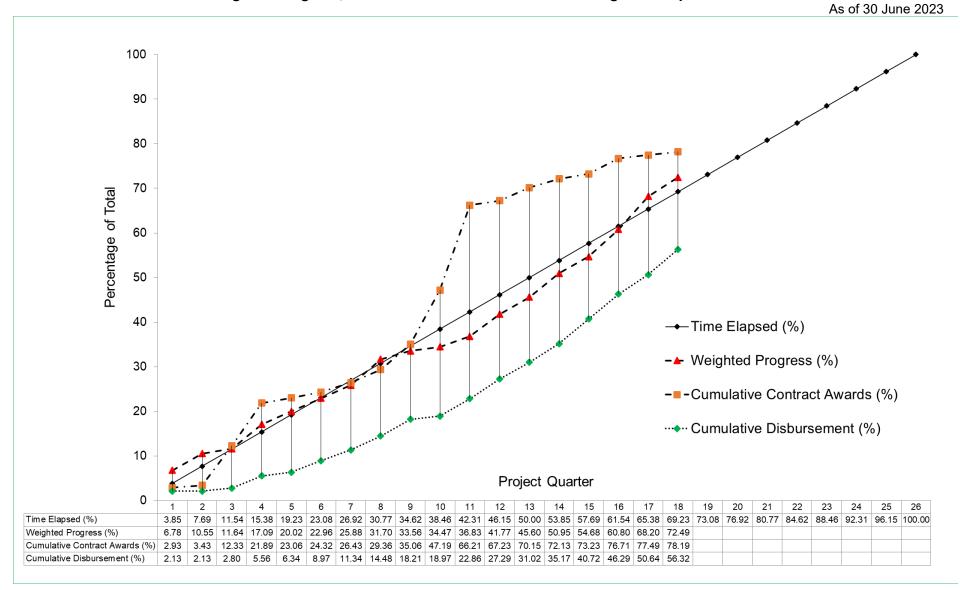

4. Implementation Arrangements

The GMS Tourism Working Group functions as the project's subregional steering committee and coordinates joint marketing and regional tourism standards adoption. The executing agency is MICT. A National Project Steering Committee (NPSC) has been established and meets periodically to review progress. As of 30 July 2021, the NPSC comprises the Vice Minister for Tourism, MICT (Chair), Director General of MICT's Planning and International Cooperation Department and Director Generals of the four tourism departments of MICT. NPSC members also serve on the project's bid evaluation and consultant selection committees. An 11-member project coordination committee has also been established, chaired by the project director, with members from various departments and units in MICT involved in project implementation.

MICT has established a Vientiane-based Project Coordination Unit (PCU) to handle overall project coordination and management, comprising a project director, project manager, financial controller, chief accountant, office manager, office assistant, and an internal auditor. As of 1 October 2021, the PCU financial administration capacity is strengthened with the appointment of an assistant accountant.

MICT has opened and is managing a project Advance Account and is responsible for overall financial management of the project. ADB has disbursed \$1mln into the Advance Account to facilitate implementation of project activities identified in the approved 2019 costed annual workplan for the project using the Statement of Expenditure (SOE) procedure. On 4 December 2020, ADB has approved an increase of the ceiling of the advance account from \$1.0 million to \$1.5 million and then on 3 March 2022 by another \$800,000 to \$2,300,000 to finance the Land Acquisition and Resettlement (LAR) cost.

Provincial- and district-level implementing agencies have established Project Implementation Units (PIUs), embedded within the provincial DICTs of Champasak, Luang Prabang, and Vientiane Province, and the Vang Vieng UDAA, to manage output 1 and select output 3 activities. Each PIU comprises a supervisor, director, manager, finance officer, accountant and secretary, and full-time technical teams consisting of an infrastructure, tourism coordinator, standard and capacity building coordinator, a DMN coordinator, and a marketing and product development coordinator. The PIUs at the Champasak and Vientiane Province DICTs and at the at Vang Vieng UDAA have both an infrastructure technical team to coordinate and support output 1 infrastructure activities, and a tourism technical team to coordinate and support output 2 implementation and manage select output 3 activities. Since there are no infrastructure subprojects in Luang Prabang Province, the PIU there only has a tourism technical team. PIUs have opened and are administering project sub-accounts to facilitate day-to-day project administration. Reporting, financial management, safeguards and knowledge management is led by the PCU in close coordination with all PIUs.

These implementation arrangements differ slightly from how they are described in the initial Project Administration Manuel (PAM). During the project's Mid-term Review Mission, the PAM description has been revised to reflect the actual arrangements. These changes will be incorporated by ADB in an updated version of the PAM.

5. Implementation Progress

Project scope:

The project is designed to help transform secondary GMS central and southern corridor towns into economically inclusive, competitive international tourism destinations by improving road and water transport infrastructure, urban environmental services, and capacity to sustainably manage tourism growth. It will boost trade in services and deepen regional cooperation and integration among the GMS and Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN). About

88,000 residents are expected to directly benefit from climate-resilient infrastructure development and increased access to economic opportunities.

The project impact is sustainable, inclusive, and more balanced tourism development achieved. The outcome is tourism competitiveness of secondary towns in Cambodia and the Lao PDR increased. By 2025, Cambodia and Lao PDR's share of ASEAN's international visitor arrivals will increase from 8.0% to 8.3% and project areas will receive 700,000 more international tourists. This will increase aggregate annual visitor expenditure from \$0.55 billion to \$0.91 billion.

The project has three outputs: (i) urban-rural access infrastructure and urban environmental services improved; (ii) capacity to implement ASEAN tourism standards strengthened; and (iii) institutional arrangements for tourism destination management and infrastructure O&M strengthened. Project areas in Lao PDR include Champasak, Luang Prabang and Vientiane provinces, all located along the GMS Central Economic Corridor.

Progress to date:

Outcome: Tourism competitiveness of secondary towns in the Lao PDR increased

International arrival and expenditure results for 2020 and 2021 are heavily impacted by the border closures and travel restrictions in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The country

re-opened for international tourism in May 2022. It was thought the recovery period may be long, and that as a result performance during the 2022-2024 period will be significantly lower than originally projected. While this was true for 2022, international arrivals to Lao PDR during the first six months of 2023 topped 1.6 million, 75% of the arrivals recorded in the same period in pre-pandemic 2019, an indication that arrivals may be rebounding quicker than expected.

Output 1: Urban-Rural Access Infrastructure and Urban Environmental Services Improved

Output 1 will upgrade transport infrastructure and improve environmental conditions at tourist destinations to boost tourist arrivals and receipts and catalyze additional private investment in accommodations and other tourism-related enterprises.

The Project includes the following seven infrastructure subprojects, packaged into five² works packages, as follows:

Works Package: TIIGP2-LAO-W01: Nakasang and Don Det-Don Khone Access Improvements

Subproject C1: Nakasang Access Road and Port Rehabilitation Subproject C2: Don Det-Don Khone Access Improvements

Works Package: TIIGP2-LAO-W02: Nam Ngum Reservoir Access Improvements Subproject V1: Nam Ngum Reservoir Access Improvements

Works Package TIIGP2-LAO-W03: Kaeng Yui Waterfall Access Improvements and Western Loop Rural Access Road and Bridge Improvements Subproject V2: Kaeng Yui Waterfall Access Improvements

Subproject V3: Western Loop Rural Access Road and Bridge Improvements Works Package TIIGP2-LAO-W03a: Vang Vieng Urban Renewal Subproject V4: Vang Vieng Urban Renewal

Works Package: TIIGP2-LAO-W04: Vang Vieng Landfill Improvements Subproject V5: Vang Vieng Solid Waste Management Improvements

For Works Packages TIIGP2-LAO-W01 and TIIGP2-LAO-W04, detailed engineering design (DED), bill of quantities (BOQ), technical specification, bidding documents, updated safeguards documents, and recommendations for equipment for O&M were prepared during the Project Preparation Technical Assistance (PPTA) by NorConsult under a direct contract with ADB. These two packages (for subprojects C1, C2 and V5) are referred to as "Stage 1" packages/subprojects.

For Works Packages TIIGP2-LAO-W02 and TIIGP2-LAO-W03/W03a, feasibility studies, preliminary designs, preliminary cost estimates and safeguards documents were prepared during project preparation by the PPTA Consultant PM Group under a direct contract with ADB. These two packages (for subprojects V1, V2, V3 and V4) are referred to as "Stage 2" packages/subprojects.

The Project Management and Civil Engineering Support (PMCES) Consultant - Ramboll Danmark A/S in association with Specity Solutions Consulting Co. Ltd., mobilized on 5 August 2019 to assist the PCU and PIUs with (i) review and update DED for Stage 1 subprojects; (ii) preparation of DED for Stage 2 subprojects, (iii) safeguards document updating and compliance monitoring, (iv) construction supervision, (v) preparation of operations and maintenance (O&M) plans and asset management technical training, and (vi) project management and administration.

² Originally there were four works packages, when Subproject V4: Vang Vieng Urban Renewal was included in Package TIIGP-LAO-W03. However, during the course of 2020 it became clear that coordination and alignment with the ADB-financed Water Supply and Sanitation Sector Project in Vang Vieng was needed to minimize LAR impacts and streamline execution. To not delay Subprojects V2 and V3, it was decided in September 2020 to separate Subproject V4 from Works Package TIIGP2-LAO-W03 and create a new Works Package for V4, namely TIIGP2-LAO-W03a.

Stage-1: TIIGP2-LAO-W01 and TIIGP2-LAO-W04 (subprojects C1, C2 & V5)

Stage 1 subprojects are packaged as follows:

Works Package: TIIGP2-LAO-W01: Nakasang and Don Det-Don Khone Access Improvements

Subproject C1: Nakasang Access Road and Port Rehabilitation Subproject C2: Don Det-Don Khone Access Improvements Works Package: TIIGP2-LAO-W04: Vang Vieng Landfill Improvements

Subproject V5: Vang Vieng Solid Waste Management Improvements

TIIGP2-LAO-W01: Nakasang and Don Det-Don Khone Access Improvements

The commencement letter was issued to the Contractor on 12 May 2020 and the construction work commenced on 26 May 2020. The period of performance is 731 calendar days, and the Intended Completion Date is therefore 25 May 2022. Contract Variation Order No. 1 (VO No. 1) and time extension request was approved by ADB with (i) extending the contract completion date by 319 days (10.6 months) from the intended completion date of 25 May 2022 to 10 April 2023 and (ii) changing of the original quantities of few work items in Bill No.2: Nakasang Access Road Improvements and Bill No.3: Det and Khone Island and Footpath Improvements. The proposed changes will increase the contract amounts under Bill No.2 and Bill No.3, which will be covered by the savings identified under Provisional Sum for 3 Bridges and Physical Contingencies.

Contract Variation Order (VO No. 2) was approved by ADB with (i) extending the contract by 81 days (2.7 months) from the extended completion date of 10th April to up to 30 June 2023 to complete all of outstanding works on site, especially (i) Nakasang Port Rehabilitation, (ii) Road Shoulder Improvements of all the access roads in Nakasang, Don Det and Don Khone including restoration of Nakasang, Don Det and Don Khone Accessibility, (iii) Sodding for embankment, (iv) Site Drainage of IRL-01 with Gravelling Course; (v) Street light for the port, Road furniture installation of Nakasang, Don Det and Don Khone Access Roads; (vi) replacing the existing wooden bridge with concrete deck slab on Nakasang Port Access Road; and (vii) Nakasang Parking Drainage Improvement and changing the quantities of work items savings identified from the Bill No. 1, Bill No. 2, Day Works and Physical Contingency. The Contract Amount will be remained same as the original Contract of USD3,964,308.36.

The overall implementation progress, 30th June 2023 was 100.00% (Nakasang access improvement was 28.65%, Don Khone access improvement was 57.81% and Don Det access improvement was 13.54% completed) against the implementation schedule of 100.00% (with reference to new revised schedule on 10 May 2023) including 1.82% of work progress made in June 2023, especially installation of miscellaneous works for Nakasang Access Road, Don Det – Don Khone Access Roads including reflectorized road marking, traffic signs (single and double posts), guide post, kilometer posts, and street lighting Solar DC system & floating pontoon for Nakasang Port.

TIIGP2-LAO-W04: Vang Vieng Landfill Improvements

Review findings of the DED for Package TIIGP2-LAO-W04 (Subproject V5) carried out in Q3 2019 for the landfill subproject revealed that the existing design required revision, entailing substantial alterations to the design, drawings, BoQ and technical specifications. It was further decided that an environmental compliance audit (ECA) needed to be conducted to test the design information. The PMCES Consultant engaged an ECA sub-consultant team to carry out this work, and the ECA report was approved by ADB on 22 March 2020.

The design revisions commenced during Q2 of 2020. A day-long stakeholder consultative meeting on the Draft Design was held on 26 June 2020 in Vientiane in the presence of the Vice Minister Mr. Ounthouang Khoaphanh, National Project Steering Committee, Head of DICT, Head of UDAA, Department of Housing and Urban Planning, Chief of Villages, other private and public sectors. The stakeholders provided feedback including the need for an O&M capacity assessment for solid waste management as a basis for the development of an O&M capacity building program for the Vang Vieng landfill and a financial assessment of the Vang Vieng landfill viability to be undertaken for the analysis of economical sustainability to form basis for the site management modality to be selected.

The final detailed design, safeguards documents and bidding documents were submitted for ADB's review during Q3 of 2020 and ADB cleared the design modification, safeguards and bidding documents in September, which were then sent for provincial approval. The invitation for Bids (IFB) for this Package was published on 14 September 2020, with a submission deadline and bid opening on 27 October 2020. The BER was approved in Q4 2020.

The Contract was signed on 19th February 2021. The Site possession was issued on 24 March 2021. The Notice to Proceed (NTP) was given on 5th April, 2021 with the commencement of works from 19th April 2021. The period of performance is 731 calendar days, and the intended completion date is therefore 20th April 2023.

The Works consist of:

- Construction of 2 (two) controlled landfill cells out of a total of 5 (five) cells;
- Preparatory earthworks and installation of a perimeter runoff interceptor drainage system;
- Construction of capped cell for the old waste;
- Construction of non-mechanical type material recovery facility (MRF);
- Construction of leachate collection, storage, and treatment system;
- Construction of treated leachate recirculation system;
- Construction of Faecal Sludge Treatment Plan (FSTP)/Septage Treatment Facility
- Construction of office, workshop, electrical and security buildings at the landfill site;
- Installation of Weighbridge and construction of office building
- Upgrading and elevating 0.8 km of the access road to the landfill site to be above flood levels;
- Construction of internal road and rainwater drainage system along with peripheral embankments;
- Construction of boundary wall and entrance gate:
- Construction of car washing facility;
- Construction of hazardous waste storage and landfill facility; and
- Construction of Incineration Facilities

The overall implementation progress, as of 30th June 2023, was 75.37% against the schedule of 91.72% (the revised work programme).

During this reporting period of April-June 2023, 3.24% of works progress made against 11.26% due to (i) delayed supplying building materials; (ii) delay in construction of harzadous waste

storage and incinerator buildings, and (iii) delay in construction of Planted Drying Bed and Administration Office because of lack of resources working on site.

During this quarter, the contractor progressed the construction work including (i) construction of MRF, workshop and administration buildings including fixing of doors and windows, installing of electrical network, fixing of floor tiles and ceillings; (ii) construction of incinerator room; (iii) construction of the planted drying bed (PDB); (iv) construction of landfill hazardous waste storage; and (v) waste disposal in Cell-5.

The Contract Variation Order No. 01 was approved by the ADB on 2 March 2023 including (i) the extension of the contract's intended completion date by 365 days, from 20 April 2023 to 20 April 2024, to enable completion of the remaining works; (ii) the revision of original quantities of some work items and adjust the corresponding budget allocations; and (iii) the utilization of savings under Bills No. D, G, H, K, M, P, Q, S, T, V, W, AB and Contingencies to cover the total cost changes.

The PMCES national experts (a Resident Engineer and a Supervisor) continued supervising the construction works on site to assist PIU and UDAA Vang Vieng.

Stage-2: TIIGP2-LAO-W02, TIIGP2-LAO-W03 and TIIGP2-LAO-W03a (subprojects V1, V2, V3 & V4)

In parallel to the work on the Stage-1 subprojects, the PMCES Consultant completed the final detailed design, engineering-related and safeguard-related bidding documents and updated safeguards documents, and provided inputs in the bidding documents, which have been prepared in collaboration with the Financial Management and Procurement Specialists (individual consultants engaged by the Project) for the stage-2 subprojects V1, V2, V3 & V4, packaged as follows:

Works Package: TIIGP2-LAO-W02: Nam Ngum Reservoir Access Improvements Subproject V1: Nam Ngum Reservoir Access Improvements Works Package TIIGP2-LAO-W03: Kaeng Yui Waterfall Access Improvements and Western Loop Rural Access Road and Bridge Improvements Subproject V2: Kaeng Yui Waterfall Access Improvements Subproject V3: Western Loop Rural Access Road and Bridge Improvements Works Package TIIGP2-LAO-W03a: Vang Vieng Urban Renewal Subproject V4: Vang Vieng Urban Renewal

Following the split of the original package W03 (V1-V4) into W03 (V1-V3) and W03a (V4), the bidding documents and safeguards documents for package W03a (subproject V4) would be updated and finalized during Q2 2023 subject to the physical completion of Contracts TIIGP2-LAO-W02 and TIIGP2-LAO-W03 being 50% as recommended by the ADB during the Midterm Review mission in May 2022. This is now the case and planning for W03a has re-started aiming for an issuance of an invitation for bids by October 2023, contract award by April 2024 and commencement of works by July 2024.

TIIGP2-LAO-W02: Nam Ngum Reservoir Access Improvements (Subproject V1)

During Q2 2020, a stakeholder consultative meeting on Draft Design for the subproject Nam Ngum Reservoir Access Improvements (V1) was held. The Detailed Engineering Design (DED), incorporating feedback from the consultation meeting, was submitted to MICT and ADB and was cleared by ADB in Q3 2020. The invitation for Bids (IFB) for this Package was published on 18th September 2020, with a submission deadline and bid opening on 30th October 2020.

ADB issued NOL to the BER on 20 April 2021. The Letter of Acceptance was issued on the same day to the Contractor. The contract was awarded on 26th April 2021. The site possession was given on 4th June 2021. The Notice to Proceed (NTP) was given on 16 June 2021 with commencement of works from 1st July 2021. The period of performance is 731 calendar days, and the intended completion date is therefore 30th June 2023.

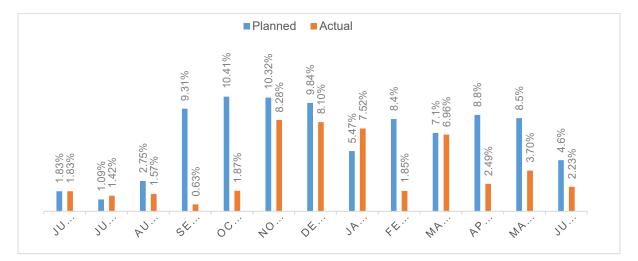
The Works for TIIGP2-LAO-W02 Consists of:

• Construction of a 1,200m2 parking area which has a capacity of 4 buses and 34 cars and an overflow parking area, which has a capacity of around 27 cars.

- Improving the existing public marina to safely accommodate 50 to 60 local tour boats and launch small recreational vessels, e.g. kayaks and sailboats;
- Renovation of the existing walkway into a friendly walking path and boardwalk, with view decks and a step landscape allowing visitors to relax, improve the accessibility of disable.
- Redevelopment of unsanitary and poorly constructed market stalls and small shops/restaurants into new 3,860m2 public market and shop houses that incorporate Lao traditional architectural design
- Construction of five private pavilions, and one iconic circular pavilion, which is the landmark of this recreational area.
- Installation of septic tanks in all public buildings and a wastewater pump out station/ holding tank at the marina, wetland treatment and Construction new site storm drainage and slope protection
- Improve domestic water supply by construction new treatment tank.
- Install new outdoor lighting, landscape fixture and waste bins.
- Construction access road and install of floating ferry dock.
- Construction of 32 Nos of Shop houses

The overall implementation progress, as of 30th June 2023 was 60.51% against the schedule of 100.00%. However, the outstanding works of 39.49% will be completed within the extended period of 12 months from 1st July 2023 to 30th June 2024.

During this report period of April-June 2023, 8.42% of works progress made against 23.96% planned. The progress of works was delayed due to (i) lack of resources at site for landscape and buildings marina works; (ii) delay in construction fill slope at marina because of lact of stone for gabion terramesh; (iii) high water level of marina which stopped working on circular pavilion; (iv) delay in installing the drainage works for access road; and (v) delay in building works particularly Public Plaza construction, Circular Pavilion Construction, and shopuhouses.



During the reporting period, the Contractor carried out (i) the general provision related to the contractor's and the engineer's facilities; (ii) the installation of U-ditches (cast-in-situ U-ditches); (iii) RC pavement; (iv) Cast-in-situ Road Kerb; (v) stone loose ripap for slope protection of internal access road AL-03 to Circular Pavilion; (vi) fill slope protection by using Terramesh system along the internal access road AL-02; (vii) the construction of foundation of shophouses Types A, B, C and D; (viii) the construction of concrete deck slab for Circular Pavilion; (ix) the construction of Stairs ST-02, ST-03, ST-5 and ST-06; and (x) the construction of intak pumphouse for water supply system.

The PMCES team joined with the ADB Midterm Review Mission in the field on 19 May 2022 and suggested to terminate this Contractor if the progress continues to slide further till 31st

July 2022 and no improved performance is being achieved. The Contractor provided (i) Updated Recovery Plan; (ii) Updated Resources Plan and (iii) Updated Priority List agreement to execute the Works. The EA starts monitoring the performance of the Contractor bi weekly basis.

The detailed work progress of each major activity, as of the end of this reporting period, are given below:

- 1. Landscape Marina was 23.95% completed
- 2. Buildings Marina was 17.23% completed
- 3. Road Improvement was 82.26% completed
- 4. Roadside Drainage system was 68.80% completed

The Contractor was continuing with implementing the 14-priority action plans (agreed in June 2022) and the progress status, as of the end of this reporting period, is summarized below:

- 4 actions fully completed (100% completed)
- 2 actions partially completed (more than 85%)
- 8 actions significantly delayed Not completed (more than 40% or above)

The overall progress of works was behind the schedule (the revised work program) delayed due to (i) **Road Works:** The Works commenced from the 1st of July 2021 and the clearing and grubbing of Road Works were impossible due to pick up of the rainy season. The Contractor could do only temporary and preparation works until the end of October 2021 as no earth movement was possible, which caused a delay of 4 months, (ii) Soil Disposal: The Local authority including PONRE approval for the designated soil disposal area was delayed from October 2021 until April 2022 which delayed the sub-grade works of the access road, causing a 6 months delay, (iii) Marina Works: The site possession was delayed until April 2022, 10 months delayed due to updating of the resettlement plan, (iv) The COVID-19 pandemic and lockdown in Lao PDR since the 24th of April to the 30th of October 2021 all factories, logistics, and laborers were forced to stop by the local government authorities to prevent spread of COVID-19, and as a result only some construction activities could be carried out on-site subject to materials provision which delayed activities planned during this 6 months period, (v) **Design Changes:** Due to change of the cut and fill slope of the marina, we could not start the marina buildings and landscaping works until September 2022, causing a 5 months delay, (vi) Water Level of Marina: Due to high water level, we could not start the fill slope of the marina until March 2023 which was a 6 months delay, (vii) Consequences of Force Majeure: The Contractor is prevented from performing its substantial obligations under the Contract by Force Majeure of which notice has been given, therefore, the Contractor proceedings was slow over 6 months period, (viii) Rock Exploration: Interrupted supply of rock due to lack of rock at the marina site with 10km hauling distance caused delay of works 3 months from March to May 2023 and (ix) the Contractor's poor planning, inadequate resources management and slow performance.

With reference to MICT letter dated 22 June 2023 and the agreements reached during the mid-term review mission from 16 May to 6 June 2022, ADB provided no objection to the propose contract variation No.1 on 28th June 2023 to extend the contract's intended completion date by 365 days, from 1 July 2023 to 30 June 2024, to enable the completion of the remaining 41.7% of works with no cost implication and unchanged total contract amount.

The original detailed engineering design of the Contract was done in 2020. When the contract commenced in July 2021, the Contractor carried out topographical survey of the existing ground and prepared the constructional/working drawings. During the Consultant's review of the working drawings as per the ground prevailing condition, some of the parameter of the soil properties were not the same as per design. For these unforeseen circumstances, it was found out that the factor of safety was not adequate against slope stability, should we follow the DED. Therefore, during the implementation of Civil Works under this package, there was site adaptation works as a basis of revisions. In addition of ground conditions, the DED failed to

address some of the resettlement issues which required either design modification or additional design as per the Revised Resettlement Plan.

The Variation Order No.1 is cost implication to the project due to modification of design for (i) the slope stability against overturning and sliding for both the marina and access road, (ii) extension of Kitchen behind the shop houses, (iii) quantities missed in the BoQ, and (iv) construction of the MPS temporary Facilities, and (v) Additional rock transportation cost outside of the project area. Due to the above factors, it changes the quantities of some work items in Bill No. 1: General Provisions, Bill No. 2: Landscape Marina, Bill No. 3: Building Marina and Bill No. 4 Road Improvement. The summary of Variation Order is as follow:

The proposed Variation Order will be needing additional USD 1,471,571.29 which is 31.52% of the original contract value. It changes of the original quantities of few work items in Bill No.1: General Provisions, Bill No. 2: Landscape Marina, Bill No. 3: Building Marina and Bill No. 4: Road Improvement keeping contingency amount in the same as previous USD 424,460.47.

Based on the additional cost, the total contract amount in US dollars will increase by USD 1,471,571.29, from USD 4,669,065.14 to USD 6,140,636.43. The VO were submitted in 22nd June 2023. ADB is in the process of reviewing this proposal, its justifications and its cost implications.

The overall implementation progress, as of 30th June 2023, was 56.27% against the revised schedule of 96.41%.

During this reporting period of April - June 2023, 10.31% of works progress made against 20.61% planned. The overall progress was delayed because of (i) lack of proper resources at site (manpower and equipment) and poor planning, (ii) delay in static load test for the bored

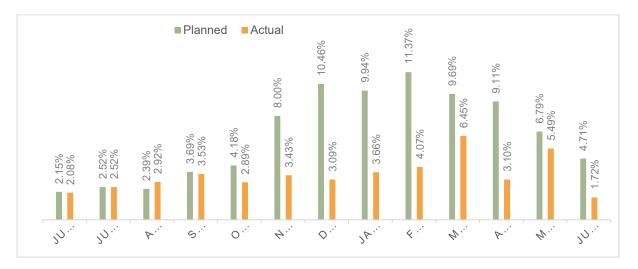
piles of the bridge work, and (iii) delay in daily progress of construction work particularly earthworks and drainage works.

During the reporting period, the contractor carried out (i) the general provision related to the contractor's and the engineer's facilities, (ii) the preparation works on site such as survey work, laboratory testing (base course materials testing, and RC pipe culvert compressive strength test) (iii) shop drawings, (iv) road maintenance, (v) RC drain work (cast-in-situ U-ditches, installation of U-ditches; (vi) RC pipe culverts with apron protection, Inlet and outlet for RC pipe culverts, (vii) the construction of 3 causeways on Wastern Loop Rural Access Road-R1; (viii) the construction of Base course for Western Loop Rural Access Road-R2; (ix) the trial pavement of 300m long on Wastern Loop Rural Access Road-R1 including Prime Coat MC70 and first sealing coat AC80/100; (x) the surface treatment for Western Loop Rural Access Road-R2 (first sealing coat), (xi) Repairing of existing Bailey bridges on Road R1&R2 including Abutment protection; (xii) Earthwork for Kaeng Yui access road at Km 5+600-5+850, and (xiii) the RC pavement of Kaeng Yui landscape; (xv) the construction of Bridge No. 01 and the construction of Bridge No. 03 at Kaeng Yui landscape; (xvi) the construction of Pier P2 for Nam Xong bridge; and (xvii) cast-in-situ I-girders for Nam Xong bridge.

The PMCES team joined with the ADB progress review mission in the field on 16th November 2022 and the ADB suggested to keep monitoring the progress continuously. The mission team suggested to terminate this Contractor if there is no progress of bored pile static load test of Nam Xong bridge done till 31ST December 2022, no progress of environmental and safety measures and no improved performance is being achieved.

- NamXong bridge: if no progress by end of Dec 2022, reduce the scope and rebid.
- W03: Renovation of existing NamXong bridge: reduce the scope due to budget limitation, suggests to explore PPP arrangement.
- Add 2 new bridges to Kaengyui Waterfall Access Road and to process contract variations in Mar 2023 if satisfactory progress.

The average physical progress executed by the contractor during this reporting period is 3.44% against the average planned rate of 6.87% as detailed progress shown in the below chart.



The detailed work progress of each major activity, as of the end of this reporting period, are given below:

- 1. V2-subproject: Kaeng Yui Waterfall Access Improvements was 60.37% completed
- 2. V3-subproject: Watern Loop Rural Access Road Improvements was 53.87% completed
- 3. Nam Xong Bridge construction was 51.79% completed

Regarding the Health and Safety measurement, the following activities were being implemented by the Contractor on site during the reporting period are:

- Emergency and first aid drill conducted, safety procedure plans are being implemented and monitored.
- > CEMP revision completed.
- > Prepared a health and safety handbook and Emergency contact of project site
- > Conducted construction toolbox meeting regularly by contractor
- Develop safety procedures and measures for hazardous construction activities and Conducted the Hazard Assessment Training.

The Contractor was also continuing with implementing the 11-priority action plans (agreed in June 2022) and the progress status, as of the end of this reporting period, is summarized belowiprity Action List agreed in the Management Meeting No.

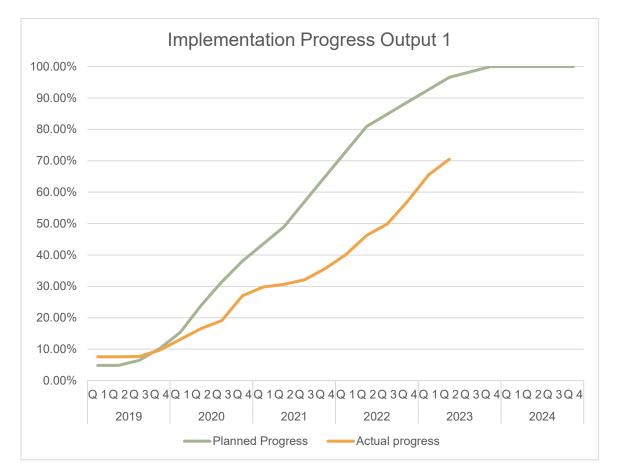

Overall progress of Output 1 implementation as of Q2 2023 is 70.49% against 97.21% planned. Detailed progress of Output 1 civil works subproject implementation as of 30 June 2023 is summarized in Annex 1.

Output 2: Capacity to implement ASEAN Tourism Standards strengthened

Output 2 will: (i) support the ASEAN Tourism Standards national implementation by establishing and strengthening certification bodies and assessment frameworks, promoting and facilitating adoption of the standards by the tourism sector, and establishing sustainable financing mechanisms; and (ii) support the implementation of selected ASEAN Tourism Standards and the ASEAN Sustainable Tourism Awards.

There are seven ASEAN Tourism Standards currently being applied in Lao PDR: (i) Clean Tourist City; (ii) Homestay; (iii) Community-Based Tourism; (iv) Public Toilet; (v) Green Hotel; (vi) Spa Service; and (vii) Meetings, Incentives, Conferences and Exhibitions (MICE). In addition, Lao PDR also implements the ASEAN Sustainable Tourism Awards (ASTA).

Six of the seven Standards have been adapted to the Lao context and one is applied in the original ASEAN format (Green Hotel Standard). The MICE Standard is broken down into three sub-categories of Meeting Rooms, Exhibition Venues and Event Venues. These three are currently being adapted to the Lao context.

As per the rules governing the use of ASEAN Standards, each ASEAN Member State can make minor modifications to each Standard in order to reflect the local context. These can be awarded as ASEAN Standards by member countries at the Asian Tourism Forum once every two years (Green Hotel, Clean Tourist City, MICE Venue, MICE Special Events and ASTA, in even years and Homestay, Public Toilet, Spa Services and Community Based Tourism in odd

years). There is no limit to the number of ASEAN Standard certificates that can be issued in each country.

There are however limits set by the ASEAN Secretariat for the number of certificates that can be awarded at the annual ASEAN Tourism Forum (ATF). This showcases certificates that have been awarded by each country. Quotas apply for each Standard in order to keep the ATF award ceremony manageable. The ATF awards covering the Project's timeframe are as follows:

Implementation of the ASEAN Tourism Standards in Laos is subject to: (i) translation into Lao; (ii) adaptation to become a Lao – ASEAN Tourism Standard; (iii) translation into English; (iv) approval by the Tourism Vice Minister; (v) publication; (vi) preparation of assessment and certification manuals; (vii) dissemination to National and Provincial Assessment Committees; (viii) training of trainers; and (ix) training of all members of Assessment Committees and National Steering Committees. Once these assessment frameworks are in place and operational, the standards will be widely promoted within the sector to encourage implementation leading to certification.

2.1 National ASEAN Tourism Standards adaptation

All of the ASEAN Tourism Standards for Community Based Tourism, Homestay, Public Toilets, Clean Tourist City, MICE Meeting Room and Spa Services have been adapted to become Lao Tourism Standards. The Green Hotel Standard will be applied in an unmodified form. The Tourism Vice Minister has yet to approve all of the Lao Tourism Standards that have been adapted. Until the Lao Tourism Standards are approved by the Vice Minister, the Project's intention is to continue using the full ASEAN Tourism Standards (also refer 2.4 ASEAN Tourism Standards Promotion).

2.2 Establishment of certification bodies and processes

National and Provincial Steering Committees (also known as Certification Bodies) have been established to guide and certify ASEAN Tourism Standards. At the provincial level, there is one Certification Body/Committee covering all tourism standards. Provincial Committees coordinate with National Standards Committees during the certification process.

The composition of national and provincial level Certification Bodies was adjusted in 2021 to increase participation by women. This is now completed with 41% participation by women, on average, across all Certification Bodies.

2.3 Assessor Training

As of 30 June 2023, there are 12 (5 women) ASEAN Master Trainers within MICT who will continue to train trainers and assessors from the national and provincial Assessment Committees / Certification Bodies. There is also 62 National Trainers (34 women) and 106 Provincial Trainers (38 women), 94 National Assessors (48 women) and 106 Provincial Assessors. This provides the capacity considered necessary to achieve most, if not all, of the Output 2 DMF targets. Training will continue in the second half of 2023, focusing on building the capacity of assessors at provincial level.

2.4 ASEAN Tourism Standards promotion

The status of promotion of the standards as end of Q2 2023 is as follows:

- Further input is required from the private sector to raise awareness and increase the uptake of the ASEAN Tourism Standards. The benefits of being certified need to be discussed and agreed with the industry before any financing mechanism can be put in place.
- The Tourism Standards website is expected to be finally launched in September, 2023. Once the adapted Standards for Lao have been approved by the Vice-Minister, these will be uploaded to the website.

2.5 ASEAN Tourism Standards and ASEAN Sustainable Tourism Awards implementation

Although the earliest awards of ASEAN Tourism Standard certifications date back to 2008, over 70% of certifications have occurred since 2012. Due to a possible misunderstanding of the need to re-certify every 2 to 3 years, there is a high number of certificates that have expired in the Project Provinces:

An ongoing priority for 2023 is to re-certify all expired certificates for Green Hotel, Homestay and Clean Tourist City Standards. Getting Vang Vieng City ready for certification to ASEAN Clean Tourist City Standard in 2026 is also a priority for the 2023 and 2024 work plans. A process of self-assessment by expired award-holders, with quality control checks by the EA, was agreed as the best way to fast-track the re-certification process and potentially attain the DMF targets (refer Annex 3).

Laos was awarded 35 ASEAN Tourism Standards at the 2023 ASEAN Tourism Forum in Indonesia. As a result, progress towards the DMF targets for Output 2 have been updated for this quarter as well as targets re-set for project completion. These are presented in the following table:

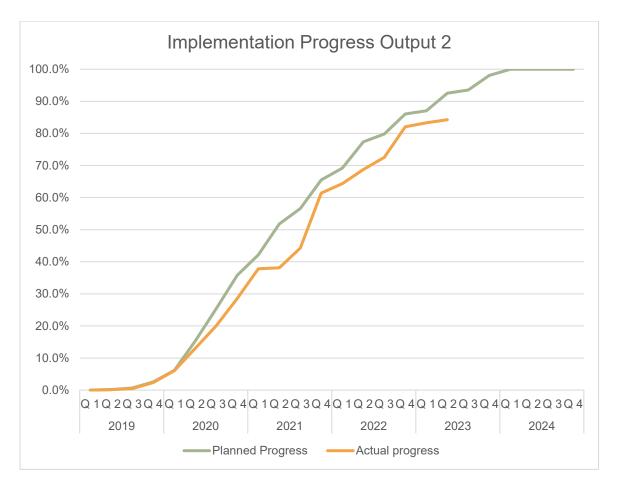

The certification cycle for Green Hotels and Homestays is every two-years. The next and final opportunity to certify new Green Hotels and Homestays, and re-certify those that are expired, is in 2024. If the project is extended by 1 year, there is another opportunity in early 2026 to certify additional Green Hotels and Homestays and still be included in the project's completion report.

Annex 11 includes an overview of certifications for ASEAN Tourism Standards since 2008.

Overall progress of Output 2 implementation as of Q1 2023 is 84.3% against 92.6% planned. Annex 2 includes a complete overview of Output 2 activities implemented during Q1 of 2023. The DMF, in Annex 3, also includes progress updates on Output 2 activities.



<u>Output 3 progress: Institutional capacity for tourism destination management and infrastructure O&M strengthened</u>

Output 3 will: (i) build capacity among public and private stakeholders in the tourism sector to sustainably develop, manage, and market tourist destinations; and (ii) build capacity for infrastructure operation and maintenance (O&M) through the preparation of O&M plans and training to implement the plans.

The project is supporting the establishment and capacity building of destination management networks (DMNs) for: Lao PDR (National DMN), Luang Prabang Province, Southern Laos (incl. Champasak, Sekong, Attapeu and Salavan Provinces), Vientiane Province and Vang Vieng Town.

<u>3.1 Destination Management Network Institutional Strengthening</u> <u>3.2 Destination Management Plan Preparation</u>

These two activities will: (i) establish and strengthen destination management networks (DMNs) for joint public-private destination planning and raise destination management practices to international standards, (ii) build capacity within these DMNs to strengthen/develop comprehensive destination management plans (DMPs); and (iii) strengthen policies and procedures needed to ensure the effective implementation of DMPs, including through joint implementation of Output 2 and 3 activities.

The DMNs for Lao PDR, Luang Prabang and Southern Laos, supported under the TIIGP1, were reviewed and membership was updated, and new DMNs for Vientiane Province and Vang Vieng were established in 2019. Strengthening of DMNs is ongoing through training and exchanges. DMPs, including action plans, for all five target destinations were completed during Q4 2019 and published in Q1 2020.

The national-level DMN was also restructured to be better prepared to facilitate the implementation of the DMP and the public and private sector action plan. All DMN memberships were reviewed and updated to improve the gender balance to ensure gender targets of the project (30 % of DMN managers and 40% of DMN membership are women) are met.

During the course of the project, significant progress has been made regarding effectiveness of the national level DMN to fulfil its envisioned role to direct joint public-private destination planning and address issues faced by the tourism industry. This is partially due to adopting the first two recommendations made in a 2015 ADB-commissioned report entitled "Establishment of a National Tourism Destination Management Network in Lao PDR", which recommends that (i) the DMN is co-chaired by a senior MICT official and a representative from the private sector, and (ii) that issue papers are prepared prior to the DMN meetings to ensure structured discussions can be held to explore and agree on policy interventions to facilitate the industry. Was the DMN initially chaired by a MIC official only, as of 2022, it has a co-chair from the private sector, illustrating the trust that has been built through the earlier period of collaboration in the framework of the DMN. Moreover, were issues raised by the private sector at DMN meetings initially ad hoc, during more recent public-private sector consultation meetings, issues papers were prepared outlining pertinent concerns from the private sector as well as the public sector to facilitate the discussion between public and private sector DMN members and representatives from other, related government offices invited based on the issues to be discussed, and development partners.

During Q2 of 2023, DMN meetings were held in Champasak province, Luang Prabang province and at national level. The purposes were to review the 2023 DMN action plan implementation progress and plan for the 2nd semester of 2023. In Champasak and Luang Prabang provinces, the DMN action plans include participation in and organization of local tourism promotional events, regional and international travel trade fairs, implementation of ASEAN tourism standards and skills development. The draft Laos tourism marketing campaign plan for Visit Laos Year 2024 was also presented at the national DMN meeting.

3.3 Policy, Regulation and Master Planning Support

This activity supports the work on tourism policy in the framework of the DMNs, the development of subregional, national and provincial/local-level tourism regulations and national-level tourism standards not covered by the ASEAN tourism standards, and the preparation and implementation of tourism master plans for project supported destinations.

DMN Policy Taskforces meet regularly to identify and discuss policy issues affecting tourism sector in project target destinations. Recent focus has been on plans for post-COVID-19 recovery, easing visa requirements for target markets etc.

Tourism masterplanning work for the project target areas of Siphandone, Nam Ngum 1 Reservoir and Luang Prabang City commenced in Q4 2019 but was delayed as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. Following the country re-opening post-COVID-19 in May 2022, work continued. However, in response to an urgent request from the Government the project agreed to support updating of the Vang Vieng tourism masterplan. Contracts with the tourism masterplanning consultants were amended to include this task. As a result, the focus of tourism masterplanning work during the second half of 2022 and the first half of 2023 was on completing the Vang Vieng masterplan update, and is now shifting back to complete the plans for Luang Prabang (integrated with a Tourism Management Plan requested by UNESCO), Nam Ngum and Siphandone. It is expected that this work will be completed by Q2 2024.

3.4 Destination Marketing and Promotion Support

This activity supports destination marketing and promotion, with a strong emphasis on publicprivate collaboration. It includes support for market research, branding, print and online promotion, including the use of social media, familiarization programs, and participation in tourism forums and trade events. Training for DMN members, including implementation of ASEAN guidelines for promotional materials, will also be provided.

Destination marketing activities were included in the public and private sector action plan on destination management for 2021, 2022 and 2023.

During Q2 of 2023, support was given through DMN mechanisms to public and private sector in participating in BITE (Beijing International Tourism Expo) in China during 16 – 18 June 2023. See Travel Trade Fair Participation Result below. Public and private stakeholders have been informed about upcoming travel trade fairs, including Thai Tiew Thai in Aug, ITE Ho Chi Minh, CITIE China, and Adventure Travel World Submit in Sep, ITB Asia in Singapore in Oct, WTM London in Nov and ITB Berlin in Mar 2024. The project has been working closely with the tourism marketing department in coordination with target participants and event organizers. Further, a Laos tourism marketing campaign plan for Visit Laos Year 2024 has been developed in consultation with public and private stakeholders, and content will be prepared in Aug and the campaign plan will be executed in Q3-Q4 of 2023. ATF 2024 will be featured as part of the campaign. Key local tourism events have been identified in the national and project target area DMN action plans, the support is being given to the public and private sector in preparing the events, including Pakse Half Marathon in Sep, cycling promotional event between Cambodia and Lao PDR at Don Det-Don Khone in Sep, Luang Prabang Ultra Trail in Oct, Luang Prabang Ngam Tae Oh in Oct, and Vang Vieng Half Plus Marathon in Dec 2023.

3.5 Heritage Interpretation Support

This activity is supporting DMNs to carry out: (i) cultural and natural heritage research and interpretation, including the development of heritage trails, signage, leaflets, guidebooks, maps and digital interpretation; and (ii) heritage guide training.

Heritage interpretation strategies for Siphandon (Champasak), Luang Prabang Town and Environs, Vientiane Province and Vang Vieng Town and Environs, finalized during Q2 2020, were designed and printed. Implementation was scheduled to commence in Q1/2 2021. Key tourist sites and routes in the project target areas were prioritized based on the heritage interpretation strategies in Q1 2021.

During Q2 of 2023, the 1st batch of Luang Prabang heritage interpretation panel texts in Lao language has been proof-read, the contents are being reviewed and will be approved by Luang Prabang DICT / PIU in Q3. The 2nd and 3rd batches are being written by the interpretation specialist. Contents for directional signposts for the 4,000 Islands have been prepared and share with Champasak PIU, contents will be finalized in Q3, signs will be designed, produced and installed by Q4. 3.6 Tourism-related SME development

This activity is providing tourism-related SMEs in the project target areas with: (i) business planning, management and marketing training; (ii) hospitality services training; (iii) support for product diversification, quality and safety enhancement; (iv) equipment to improve hospitality services and product quality and safety; and (v) tourism marketing and business networking support.

During Q1 of 2023, further SMEs need assessments were conducted in the project target areas, during Q2 the SME development plan was drafted, discussed, and reviewed by PIUs

and will be finalized in Q3 of 2023. An SME database was developed, and 2019 – 2022 data is being entered by M&E specialists while the 2023 data and onwards will be added during implementation of the planned SME activities. The database will be consolidated and accessible online in Q3 of 2023. A summary report will be included in Q3 2023 quarterly report.

3.7 Establish and Maintain Internet-based Tourism Knowledge Repositories

This activity supports DMNs to establish Internet-based tourism knowledge repositories, including lists of DMN members and contact details, approved DMPs, DMN meeting reports, training materials, opportunities for financial and technical support, tourism statistics, and brand-related artwork, photo libraries, and standard copy promotional materials.

The Laos DMN website was developed in Q2 2021, (<u>www.laos-dmn.com</u>). Documents relevant for the sector, including DMN related document, will be uploaded to the site as they become available. During Q 4 of 2021, relevant documents and news were uploaded into the website, such as MICT Ministerial Agreement on National DMN structure, DMN action plan 2022, DMN and Country Reopening Preparation Committee meetings.

During Q2 of 2023, news and relevant documents from DMN meetings at national level and project target areas were uploaded into the www.laos-dmn.com and posted on its Facebook page and group.

3.8 Develop infrastructure O&M plans with sustainable finance mechanisms

This activity will facilitate preparation of O&M plans for all output 1 infrastructure, incorporating (i) preventative, regular, and emergency maintenance procedures; (ii) O&M staffing and training needs; (iii) administrative requirements; (iv) monitoring requirements and procedures; (v) sustainable income generating mechanisms to finance O&M (e.g. environmental charges or tourist entry fees); (vi) opportunities for public-private partnerships; and (vii) financial management procedures.

Subproject: Vang Vieng Solid Waste Management Improvements:

A site inspection was carried out at the end of June by the Institutional and Environment Team, and actions were agreed with the contractor. In the inspection report, a large number of issues were identified, including eight that present hazards that have high potential impact on health and safety; three hazards that have lower health and safety impacts; and six operational issues. A follow-up meeting was held in Vientiane by all consultants to discuss approaches to landfill cell management, management of leachate, rules for informal workers, improved construction site hygiene, and changes to unsafe working practices.

Institutional consultants continued to provide support to the Procurement team on technical aspects relating to the specifications and requirements for the purchase of equipment, noting the critical importance of obtaining key landfill equipment. It is understood that all procurement will not be undertaken in one batch. Institutional experts have raised concerns about this approach with respect to the timing (noting that final decisions on all equipment can't be made until the procurement of a PPP arrangement for the Materials Recovery Facility since the private operator is likely to invest in capital equipment in this facility, which will free up Project budgets for wider investment). The delay means that it is now challenging to bring UDAA into the direct management of the site, which is a lost opportunity as they could have been provided with support over the next year to become accustomed to managing landfill cells. Furthermore, the delay in procurement has critical impacts on the purchase of PPE, life-saving water equipment, and the purchase of a weighbridge, which is a key part of being able to generate waste data and also introducing landfill gate fees.

<u>Subproject: Kaeng Yui Waterfall Access Improvements:</u> A workshop was convened in May with the Vang Vieng local authorities, private investors, and the local community. The workshop included a series of presentations on the progress of the project and on institutional arrangements. The institutional presentation provided an outline of why tourism infrastructure is important; O&M plans; resources, human and financial capacity; key O&M tasks at Keang Yui; and different options for management of the site (public, private, community). A presentation was also given by the private sector (Green Discovery) on potential approaches and management of the site. Further work is now to be undertaken on proposed concepts for O&M.

<u>Subproject: Nakasang and Don Det-Don Khone Access Improvements:</u> The PMCES Consultants developed further concepts for institutional arrangements based on the earlier consultation held with the local authorities and communities in April 2023. A further round of consultations was held in June to seek agreement on the proposals. The local authorities agreed to the approach of using the private sector to run the car park in Nakasang; the Boat Association to manage the port area; the five Row Car Association to manage the old French Port; and private entrepreneurs to manage the locomotive shelter in Don Kon and the viewpoint at Hang Kon.

A draft O&M Plan has been developed for all sites under this sub-project. The draft O&M Plan includes chapters on the following: introduction to site facilities and project development; institutional arrangements (management and business models); operations and maintenance approaches and tasks for each site; capacity development; dispute resolution; and appendices that provide numerous forms for surveys and record keeping.

3.9 Facilitate Public-Private Partnerships for operations and maintenance.

This activity will: (i) prepare feasibility studies for the operation of public tourist facilities and ancillary services that have the potential to be privately managed under public-private partnerships (PPP); and (ii) establish service contracts, management contracts, and/or lease contracts with private entities through public tender.

Subproject V5: Vang Vieng Solid Waste Management Improvements:

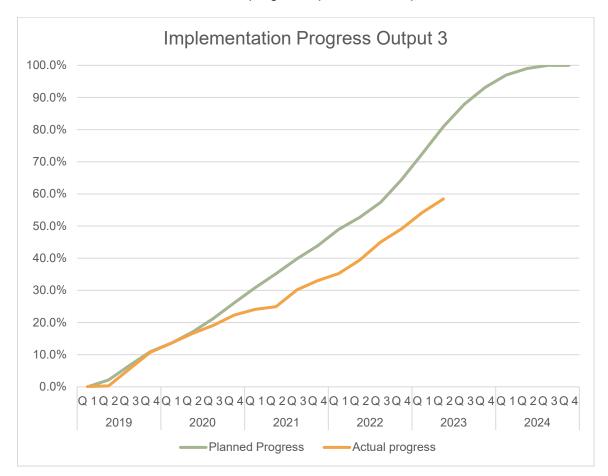
Consultants supported the PPP Consultant, Stanley Boots, in his visit to Vang Vieng. This included arranging a meeting with private companies who already work on SWM in Laos, a meeting with the UDDA, and a visit to the landfill. A second meeting of all development partners engaged in solid waste management (SWM) work in Vang Vieng, which provided an opportunity for updates on projects and for the PPP specialist to get a broader understanding of the sector. A total of 18 participants attended (MICT PCU, PPP Specialist, ZeroWaste Laos, GIZ, SwissContact, GGGI, SETS/Laobiogas, Plan International (SUSTOUR Laos), Tourism Development departments of MICT, and public health consultants.

A bilateral meeting was also held with GGGI regarding more formal collaboration with their AMUSE Project. This includes the potential for looking at joint investment into wider SWM equipment and capacity needs, including collection. The GGGI will update their project ToR and share it with institutional consultants for comment.

3.10 Infrastructure O&M training

<u>Subproject V5: Vang Vieng Solid Waste Management (SWM) Improvements:</u> Consultants have supported engineers in the operations of site, including addressing the challenges of compacting wastes and managing leachate.

Overall progress of Output 3 implementation as of Q1 2023 is 58.4% against 80.9% planned. Implementation suffered some delays due to the travel restrictions during the COVID-19 pandemic. Since travel restrictions have been lifted, implementation has accelerated.



Annex 2 includes a complete overview of Output 3 activities implemented during Q2 of 2023. The DMF, in Annex 3, also includes progress updates on Output 3 activities.

Performance monitoring:

The primary tool to monitor project performance is the Project Performance Management System (PPMS), which includes systems and procedures for the systematic collection of baseline, progress and endline data and to report progress towards the project's outcome and output targets defined in the project Design and Monitoring Framework (DMF) and implementation of project activities, gender equity results and data for economic and financial analysis and information needed to prepare photo stories and impact stories. A draft PPMS was prepared and submitted to ADB in April 2020. After several rounds of review, a final draft, incorporating ADB's comments, including feedback provided during the Mid-Term Review Mission, was submitted on 7 November 2022.

The PPMS, which was finalized with delay, describes data collection and reporting procedures and formats developed and implemented by the project alongside the PPMS development process. As a result, the PPMS documents these already existing and tested procedures. Refresher training recommended in the PPMS have been conducted for PCU and PIUs during Q2 2023.

The PCU is responsible for quarterly reporting on the performance of the project through quarterly progress reports to ADB against DMF targets and using the weighted project implementation table included in the PAM (updated from time-to-time). The DMF in the PAM contains outcome and output baseline and targets for Cambodia and Lao PDR combined. Progress towards DMF targets reported in the quarterly progress reports will reflect Lao PDR's contribution to these combined targets.

Progress as of 30 June 2023 towards DMF targets and activity implementation is presented in Annex 3. Note that the DMF has been enhanced with separate gender output indicators and expanded key activities reflecting PAM, and revised milestones matching the updated implementation plan. The updated implementation plan (reflecting latest, updated implementation schedule for all activities and revised assigned weights, provided by ADB) and weighted project progress as of 30 June 2023 are presented in Annex 4.

6. Financial Management

Disbursement Arrangement:

The Ministry of Finance has established a pass-through account for the grant to receive and track grant disbursements before passing funds on to the project's advance account. MICT has established an advance account in US Dollars for the grant at the Banque Pour Le Commerce Extérieur Lao Public (BCEL), which is exclusively used for ADB's share of eligible

expenditures. The four PIUs have set up project subaccounts for the ADB grant at local branches of the BCEL. Liquidation of the sub-accounts is subject to submission of full documentation to the PCU.

Advance Fund Procedure and Statement of Expenditure Procedure:

Upon approval of MICT's first Withdrawal Application and Estimate of Expenditure Sheet for ADB has disbursed \$1.0 million into the advance account on 2 April 2019. The PCU is using the Statement of Expenditure (SOE) procedure for the reimbursement of eligible expenditures or liquidation of advances to the advance account for individual payments up to \$100,000. As of 30 June 2023, the Project has spent the amount \$10.752 million through the advance account. The amount of \$0.431 million for March and April 2023 is still for ADB processing while the expenditure for May and June 2023 will be submitted to ADB soon. ADB has approved the increase in the ceiling of the advance account to \$1,500,000 on 4 December 2020 and to \$2,300,000 on 3 March 2022. As of 30 June 2023, the advance account including the PIU subaccounts have a balance of \$1.868 million.

Counterpart Fund:

The Government provides counterpart funds to finance government counterpart staff salaries and office space (in-kind). The cost of land acquisition and resettlement (in-cash) was originally also planned to be financed by the Government. However, in Q3 2020 it was agreed that LAR costs will be financed from the grant proceeds. The PCU will be responsible for: (i) preparing disbursement projections; and (ii) requesting budgetary allocations for counterpart funds. The counterpart contribution is recorded by the new accounting software.

Accounting:

The Project maintains separate books and records by funding source for all expenditures incurred on the project following international public-sector accounting standard for cashbased accounting and will prepare consolidated project financial statements in accordance with the government's accounting laws and regulations which are consistent with international accounting principles and practices.

The International and National Financial Management and Procurement Specialists (individual consultants engaged by MICT) are supporting procurement activities and have supported the PCU with the establishment of the financial management system, including the preparation of the Financial Management Manual (FFM) for the project, which was completed in December 2019. There were some revisions to the chart of accounts and attached an annex to the FMM. A Lao-language version of the FFM has been prepared by the Internal Auditor and was shared with the PIUs. The Project has procured an accounting software and is now operational. An excel based accounting system is still being used in parallel to record the Project financial transactions to ensure accuracy. The data from the excel based recording are exported to the accounting software on a monthly basis.

Auditing and Public Disclosure:

MICT has appointed an Internal Auditor (individual consultant) to oversee all project financial transactions and advise on measures to improve compliance with ADB and Government financial regulations and the project Financial Management Manual. He is also supporting PCU and PIU financial management staff prepare for annual external audits.

Annual project financial statements (APFS) are audited by the State Auditing Organization of Lao PDR (SAO). The first annual audit to cover the period 25 December 2018 to 31 December 2019 was submitted to ADB on 29 October 2020 after ADB's extension of the deadline to 31 December due to COVID-19. The audited project financial statements and auditor's opinion was disclosed in the ADB website on 18 November 2020. The audited financial statements for Fiscal Year 2020 were due for submission to ADB on 30 June 2021. Due to the COVID lockdown (started in April 2021), the Project in consultation with SAO requested for an

extension in submission to 30 September 2021. The 2020 APFS was submitted to ADB on 21 September 2021 and disclosed in the ADB website on 28 September 2021. The APFS for FY 2021 was submitted to ADB on 28 June 2022 and was disclosed on the ADB website. The financial statements for FY 2022 has been submitted to SAO in February 2023 and currently SAO is finalizing the audit, a bit late for June 30 2023 deadline.

Progress on implementation of the Project Financial Management Action Plan as of 30 June 2023 is presented in Annex 5.

7. Procurement

Procurement Plan:

The project's original 18-month Procurement Plan prepared during project preparation is included in the PAM (version 0, dated 22 May 2018). The Procurement Plan gets updated regularly. The latest version is Version 7, dated 18 March 2023, which was updated following the submission of the 2023 workplan to accommodate additional packages needed to implement to the approved 2023 annual workplan. The updated procurement plan was approved and disclosed by ADB on 18 March 2023.

Health and Safety Improvements:

During Q2 2023, the PMCES Consultant continued to implement the "Safety Improvement Plan" for all subprojects. PMCES Consultant introduced the contractors to the occupational health and safety hazard assessment checklist and risk assessment template that PMCES had developed in the previous quarter. The actions to be taken by the contractors to improve health and safety are gradually being implemented although at a slower pace than planned. The status of implementation is summarized below for each subproject, and a complete overview is included in Annex 13.

Package TIIGP2-LAO-W01: Subproject C1: Nakasang Access Road and Port Rehabilitation and Subproject C2: Don Det-Don Khone Access Improvements.

Environmental safeguards: The updated IEE and EMP for these two subprojects were approved by ADB in September 2019. With assistance from the PMCES Consultant, the contractor updated the CEMP, which was then approved by PCU on 06 December 2020 and submitted to ADB. The CEMP training for the contractor and the PIU was conducted on 21-23 December 2020.

The status of the roll-out of the contractor's responsibilities under the safety improvement plan developed by the PMCES Consultant is summarized here below:

The PMCES environmental specialist visited the subproject in June 2023. Overall, the contractor for each contract was implementing appropriate environmental, health and safety measures; however, there were some issues identified, and the contractor was instructed to make the necessary improvements:

- The camps, batching plant are in the closure status, and those sites rehabilitation, including the cleanliness, the full agreed hand-over site between the contractor and the land owner shall be prepared and submitted to the PIU/PMCES during July to August 2023.
- All the completed subprojects including Nakhasang and Don Det Don Khone access roads, Nakhasang Port and other improvement sites shall be cleaned and handed over to PCU/PIU in July 2023.

Social safeguards: In Q2 2022 a Corrective Action Plan compensation phase 2 (CAP 2) was prepared, approved and implemented. Total amount of compensation paid under this final Phase 2 was 153,130,917 LAK. The social safeguard team prepared the Corrective Action Plan (2 phases) and Compensation Completion Report in Q3 and Q4 respectively. After review by PCU it was submitted to ADB in March 2023 and was disclosed in Q2.

An External Monitor mission is due to be carried out early in Q3 and will be reported on in the next reporting period.

Package TIIGP2-LAO-W02: Subproject V1: Nam Ngum Reservoir Access Improvements.

Environmental safeguards: The IEE and EMP for the subproject were updated in July 2020, and Vientiane PONRE issued the Environmental Compliance Certificate for the IEE and EMP on 07 September 2020. ADB issued no-objection with certain conditions to the updated IEE and EMP on 17 September 2020. These conditions including obtaining approval from the relevant government authorities for use the land inside the Phou En District Protection Forest for the subproject were subsequently met and accepted by ADB on 18 December 2020. The PMCES Consultant further updated the IEE and EMP and submitted the documents to MICT and ADB on 29 December 2020. ADB cleared the updated IEE and EMP on 26 February 2021. The UXO Clearance Certificate was issued on 11 March 2021. The contactor produced the

first draft CEMP in June 2021 and during Q4 2021, the contractor revised the CEMP based on comments from PMCES. Following the issuance of a design certificate for the proposed spoil disposal site by the Department of Public Work and Transport of Vientiane Province on 21 March 2022 and the approval of the site by the Provincial Department of Natural Resources and Environment on 29 April 2022, the CEMP was finally approved in May 2022. During the reporting, there was a proposed Rock extraction for retaining wall from constractor. the contractor requested permission to extract 10,000 m3 of rock by excavating a 80 m wide and 160 m long section of the mountain riverside along the loop road currently under construction from National Road No. 10 to the Marina. The contractor has obtained approval from the Provincial Governor and has consulted with relevant provincial departments including Vientiane Provincial Department of Public Works and Transport, Department of Natural Resources and Environment and Department of Energy and Mines. These departments are considering the proposal and are expected to issue their approvals/certificates with certain conditions within April/May 2023. However, the rock extraction still in concern on potential environemntal impact to Provincial Protected forestry Phou Arn area. PMCES has agreed on the alternative of rock supply service in Vang Vieng guarry site to supply those rock to the ongoing site construction at Marina and other requires of rock of W02.

During Q2 2023, PMCES Environmental specialists have conducted field missions to monitor the implementation of the EMP/CEMP and to follow-up on implementation of specific measures required by PMCES during earlier missions.

The key results following the site inspections include:

- **Spoil backfilling**. At the backfilled slope at the reservoir shoreline from km 4+200 to 4+350 along the contractor's work site for truck garage, batching plant and aggregate crushing and stockpile, during reporting period the backfilled slope is being stable of bank protection . However, the contractor has continued implementing the bank protection measures including compaction, grass sowing and grading the site. The traffic to and from the batching plant and the garage/workshop, the site terrain has not been graded to direct surface water runoff away from the slope to the road drainage which according to the design should be connected to a sedimentation pond before being discharged into Nam Ngum Reservoir. However, during the dry season this has not caused any significant issues with sediment-laden runoff. PMCES consultant has suggested upgrading the surface drainage system before rainy season with avoid the stagnant water with muddy from truck movement in the area.
- **Batching Plant.** The contractor has operated the batching plant with pit for concrete washout from the cement trucks and two sedimentation tanks for wastewater from cleaning the concrete mixing drum. However, the area for the batching plant was rather messy with a muddy surface and concrete spills outside the pit. During reporting period, contractor has upgraded by merge the two tank sediment ponds to a bigger pond from batching washing wastewater out. PMCES Consultant, has instructed the contractor has subsequently minimized spills of concrete outside the designated pit (, during periods even a small demand for concre te, the site still appears muddy and messy), and installed guardrails around the sedimentation tanks. The contractor has been further instructed to:
 - Regular clean-up the muddy surface provide a stable surface
 - remove sediments from pits for concrete washout .
 - develop the batching plant site in accordance with the approved design. specially the pavement floor at batching platform where there is mixer drums storage, to ensure no any spillage of mixing material spill out on the ground and keep the cleanliness without any used-fuel spillage on ground.
- **Spoil Disposal Site**. During reporting period, The contractor has continued backfilling spoil materials at the disposal site that was approved by the relevant authorities and

PMCES Consultant in Q2 2022. The backfilling is not being carried out as described in the method statement, the bank protection implementation is pending and the Contractor has still not submitted an updated method statement as earlier agreed with PMCES Consultant.

- **Garage and fuel storage site**: The area is messy and untidy and the wall around the fuel tank has been broken down at one place. The contractor has been repaired the wall. However, during reporting and clean-up small oil spills and overall tidy-up the site.
- Safety and warning signs have been installed at the site, but due to the large area with many different ongoing construction activities, the contractor has to install additional safety signs, workers work onsite has lack of the Personal Protected Equipments and flagmen have to be trained and in place to direct traffic past the construction sites.
- Batching Plant Health and Safety: PMCES Consultant has undertaken a hazard assessment of the operation of the batching plant based on earlier site inspections in December 2022. PMCES Consultant found that the main hazards include working at height where trips, slips and falls at the platform or ladder to the mixing drum can result in fall injuries. The contractor has installed guardrails on the mixing drum platform and also the platform for formwork. Sometime, Workers were seen not wearing appropriate PPE and the contractor was reminded to ensure that the workers wear the correct PPE (helmet, safety shoes/boots, high-visible vest, hearing protection, and safety glasses). PMCES has instructed on the health and safety awareness and emergency drill training to carry out for all workers in the batching plant.
- Rock Extraction for Retaining Wall: In March 2023, the contractor requested • permission to extract 10,000 m3 of rock by excavating a 80 m wide and 160 m long section of the mountain riverside along the loop road currently under construction from National Road No. 10 to the Marina. The reason for the request is due to the demand for rock for the construction of the rock-filled gabion-basket retaining wall at the Marina site which is required according to the revised engineering design and therefore not included in the contractor's original construction plan. The contractor has obtained approval from the Provincial Governor and has consulted with relevant provincial departments including Vientiane Provincial Department of Public Works and Transport, Department of Natural Resources and Environment and Department of Energy and Mines. These departments are considering the proposal and are expected to issue their approvals/certificates with certain conditions within April/May 2023. In parallel, PMCES Consultant is reviewed, the method statement and submit those documents to ADB. However, the proposed rock extraction site still raised environmental concern at Provincial Protected Forestry of Phou Arn. The PMCES team has agreed to the alternative of rock supply service in Vang Vieng guarry site to supply those rock to the ongoing site construction at Marina and other requires of rock of W02.

Social safeguards: Following detailed technical discussions and additional attempts by the Project Implementation Unit (PIU) and the Resettlement Committee (RC) to identify suitable replacement land for residential structures, the provision of cash compensation, sufficient to enable access to affordable housing, has been proposed to be the method that is acceptable to households was approved by ADB.

In Q1 2023 the social safeguards team implemented all the necessary surveys and consultations to verify and justify allowances to be provided as part of the self-resettlement package. This, along with the payment for three grievances was made late in Q2 as planned and further reports on this will follow in the next quarter. The full compensation completion report will be drafted after the final payment has been made and it is expected that the marina will be open in June 2024.

Package TIIGP2-LAO-W03: Subproject V2: Kaeng Yui Waterfall Access Improvements and Subproject V3: Western Loop Rural Access Road and Bridge Improvements.

Environmental safeguards:_The IEE and EMP for subprojects V2 and V3 were updated in August 2020, and the IEE and EMP were cleared by ADB on 29 September 2020, subject to certain conditions of which the following have been met: (i) Additional public consultations with affected people were organized on 15 and 16 December 2020, (ii) Vientiane Provincial Department of Natural Resources and Environment issued the Environmental Compliance Certificate on 07 April 2021, (iii) The UXO Clearance Certificate for the Western Loop Rural Access Road and Bridge was issued on 16 December 2020, and the UXO Clearance Certificate for Kaeng Yui Waterfall was issued on 18 February 2021, and (iv) follow-up GRM training for the PIU (Vang Vieng District) was carried out on 14 December 202. PMCES Consultant updated the IEE and EMP and submitted the documents to ABD on 12 February 2021.

It has since come to light that the forest where the waterfall is located is classified as village conservation forest. PMCES Consultant and the PIU have investigated the issue and PMCES Consultant has further updated the IEE and EMP. The updated IEE explains that the parking area, adjacent tourist facilities and the footpath to the waterfall are inside the Na Duang Village Conservation Forest and to formalise the management arrangements and the legal status of the Kaeng Yui Waterfall area, wastewater treatment system as a component under the Project, the Vang Vieng District Governor has issued an Agreement on Land Certificate, No 275, Vang Vieng District Governor's Office, 07-Jul-2021, which allows for the Kaeng Yui Waterfall area to be managed under the Project and which authorises the Vang Vieng District Office of Natural Resources and Environment to issue land use certificates to that effect. Subsequently, the Vang Vieng District Office of Natural Resources and Environment has therefore issued the relevant Land Use Certificates No. 190 and 191 dated 08-July-2021. These documents confirm that the project has obtained the required permissions to be developed inside Na Duang Village Conservation Forest. The updated IEE and EMP have been submitted to ADB in April 2022.

The Site-Specific Environmental Management Plan (SSEMP) for the construction work prepared by the contractor was approved by PMCES Consultant on 11 October 2021 and in accordance with PMCES Consultant's instructions, on 07 December 2021, the contractor

submitted certificates issued by the Vang Vieng District Office of Natural Resources and Environment together with layout maps for the proposed spoil disposal sites and borrow pits.

During Q2 2023, PMCES Consultant has monitored the implementation of environmental, health and safety measures. The key findings are summarized below:

Kaeng Yui Road

- Road works are ongoing and the contactor has installed safety warning signs, but there are still some sections where warning signs and guard rails need to be installed.
- At the section with slope cut along Nam Lao River, slope stabilization work has been done the constructing a gabion retaining wall at the toe of the slope.
- At a section with an approximately 2 m deep trench (km 2+230), PMCES Consultant instructed the contractor to install proper shoring to prevent collapse.

Western Loop

- The contractor has improved the safety by barricading open manholes and installing warning signs at most of the road sections through villages; During reporting period, three causeways (including at section km 2+550; km 2+500; km 6+700) has stalled temporary safety guard drill and warning sign. However, contractor instructed by PMCES consultant to regularly monitors on health and to ensure the safety measures well implemented at sites.
- Nam Song bridge substructure is under construction. No significant environmental issues.
- At entrance of Houay Yae road section, the construction road is ongoing on backfill, install the drainage. The contractor installs warning sign, safety guard drill has installed at open drainage. However, owner of restaurant nearby has usually complaint on progress of construction is slowed and has requested the construction completion as soon as possible. The contractor has instructed by PMCES consultant to avoid temporary impact as much as possible and provides measure immediately after receiving verbal complaint by owner of restaurant.

Batching plant at contractor's camp

- As instructed by PMCES Consultant, the contractor has installed a pole for the power line and removed the power line from contacting the outside ladder on the cement silo.
- As instructed by PMCES Consultant, the silo has been equipped with a dust filter to trap dust generated duing filling the silo. However, as observed by PMCES Consultant, the effectiveness of the filter seems limited.
- The ladder to the mixing drum platform has been provided with handrails on both sides and guardrails have been installed all around the platform.

Social Safeguards: Social Safeguards: Two monitoring missions were held in this reporting period. A few minor re-occurring outstanding issues were observed, such as: (i) restoration of access to resources and assets for AHs; (ii) timely providing notice to communities about work plan and implications for households; and (iii) safety issues along the road which still need improvement especially where construction materials and plastic sheeting remained on the road posing a risk to road users.

In Q2 2023 the Compensation Completed Report (CCR) was prepared. The CCR has been submitted and disclosed.

Package TIIGP2-LAO-W04: Subproject V5: Vang Vieng Solid Waste Management Improvements.

Environmental safeguards: The IEE and EMP for sub-project V5 were updated in July 2020 based on the re-design of the landfill subproject and cleared by ADB on 15 September 2020. Vientiane PONRE issued the Environmental Compliance Certificate for the IEE and EMP on 22 December 2020. The Governor of Vang Vieng District issued a certificate of no risk of UXOs at the landfill site on 16 December 2020. The contractor submitted the first draft CEMP to PMCES Consultant on 11 March 2021. Following several rounds of comments and revisions, the contractor submitted the final draft CEMP on 25 June 2021 and PMCES Consultant has approved the CEMP with conditions related to installation of groundwater monitoring wells.

Based on technical specifications for construction of groundwater monitoring wells developed by PMCES Consultant, the contractor completed the construction of all monitoring wells in November 2021.

The contractor has conducted three rounds of environmental quality monitoring (December 2021, July 2022 and March 2023). The results of the groundwater quality monitoring in December 2021 showed high levels of COD, BOD5 and TSS potentially indicating groundwater contamination from the dumpsite. However, due to uncertainties on the performance of the sampling and testing, it was not possible to draw any conclusions. In the second round of testing in July 2022, COD and BOD5 were not detected in any of the wells, however one well immediately outside the landfill site had a rather high content iron, phosphate and suspended solids. As of writing this report, the results of the monitoring in March are not yet available.

During Q2 2023, PMCES Consultant has inspected the implementation of the EMP/CEMP. The main findings from the inspections include:

- 1. As instructed by PMCES Consultant, the contractor has built a low wall around the fuel tank at the camp site thus providing the required secondary containment.
- 2. Recommend installing handrails on both sides of the steps leading to monitoring well PW2.
- 3. The contractor shall clean-up of waste along the embankments and on both sides of the perimeter wall.

- 4. Cell No 5 has been completed and has started receiving waste from 15-Nov-2022 and is expected to be filled by Dec-2024.
- 5. The contractor shall ensure that the waste pickers wear appropriate PPE including a mask, gloves and high visibility jackets when they are working onsite.
- 6. Leachate: the current situation is a result of the inability to correctly manage landfill cell 5, poor management of the stormwater drainage system, and the lack of procurement of pumps. The heavy rain already experienced in this wet season has compounded the issue. initial situation requires to control the volume of leachate and apply it in areas where it will not cause environmental or human health impacts. This means pumping the leachate out of the stormwater pond up into the leachate ponds.
- 7. Leachate pond safety: As the ponds are now full of water, there are major health and safety concerns. Due to the steep nature and the slippery surface of the HDPE geomembrane, if someone fell into the ponds, therefore PMCES suggests to install fence to avoid people enter without permission and install warning sign at the entrance;
- 8. General site hygiene: There are concerns about general site hygiene, including maintenance of roads, discarding construction waste around the site, and lack of maintenance in ditches and gutters, which are full of waste, soil and vegetation. The contractor is to clean up then regularly.
- 9. General site hygiene: There are concerns about general site hygiene, including maintenance of roads, discarding construction waste around the site, and lack of maintenance in ditches and gutters, which are full of waste, soil and vegetation. The contractor is suggested to clean up regularly.
- 10. Burning: The burning of construction waste has been observed on the site. the contractor is suggested not burning waste, during reporting period, there is improved that no burning waste observed at landfill.
- 11. The contractor shall prevent cows from entering the landfill.
- 12. Provide regular soil cover of incoming waste to reduce flies and vermin, malodour, dust and risk of landfill fires.
- 13. Poor hygienic condition for informal recyclers, flies, and odour.

Social safeguards: During Q2 one monitoring mission was conducted along with the environment team. An issue regarding the overflow of treated water coming from the landfill was identified. In the future there may be a need for land acquisition to install mitigation measures and reduce flooding risk onto the property. This will be followed up in Q3.

Safeguard Monitoring Reporting: Under ADB Guidelines Category B projects require Semi-Annual Safeguard Monitoring Reports (SMRs) to be submitted once construction starts. The project includes civil works in residential areas, and it is a pro-poor project with a high level of community participation. The SMRs describe Social and Environmental Safeguard Compliance, actions required following issues arising and the handling process of incidents and complaints. For Environmental Safeguard Monitoring, the purpose is to monitor environmental impacts of civil works, by using EMP checklists prepared specifically for the project sites. The SMR furthermore describes planning and implementation of EMP Awareness Training and regularly assesses the project's level of social and environmental safeguard compliance.

Output 2: Capacity to implement ASEAN Tourism Standards strengthened

Focus during Q3 of 2023 will be on (i) launching the website for ASEAN Tourism Standards (ii) consultation with the private sector to raise awareness and increase uptake of ASEAN Tourism Standards (iii) re-certification of expired Green Hotel and Homestay Standards (using certified CBT Villages if needed) to make improved progress towards the DMF targets and (iv) update of the Action Plan for achieving ASEAN Clean Tourist City for Vang Vieng.

<u>Output 3 progress: Institutional capacity for tourism destination management and infrastructure O&M strengthened</u>

In Q3 of 2023, DMN work will focus on (i) continuing to support the implementation of the public and private sector action plan on destination management at the national level, Luang Prabang, Vientiane Province, Vang Vieng and Champasak province, (ii) continuing to organize public and private sector consultation meetings to identify key issues and solutions in Lao tourism sector, (iii) continuing to prepare the integrated tourism management and spatial plan for Luang Prabang and the tourism strategic and spatial plans for Nam Ngum Reservoir and Siphandone, (iv) implementing the Laos tourism marketing campaign for Visit Laos Year 2024, support DMNs organizing and participating tourism promotional events and travel trade fairs (v) implementing the detailed thematic heritage interpretation plans for Luang Prabang town and environs and the 4,000 islands, and write interpretation panel texts for Vientiane province and Vang Vieng, (vi) finalizing SME support plans for the project target areas, including SME database, and (vii) updating contents on the Internet based tourism knowledge repository and DMN website.

Regarding institutional arrangements for O&M planning work, the focus during Q3 of 2023 will be on the following:

<u>Subproject: Nakasang Access Road and Port Rehabilitation and Subproject C2: Don Det-Don</u> <u>Khone Access Improvements:</u> The draft O&M plan will be presented to PCU for approval. The document will be translated into the Laos language and presented to the local authorities. The Institutional consultants will support the local authorities in developing the PPP arrangements with the private operator for the management of Nakasang car park.

<u>Subproject V1: Nam Ngum Reservoir Access Improvements.</u> Undertake a field visit to establish concepts for O&M.

<u>Subproject V2: Kaeng Yui Waterfall Access Improvements.</u> The PMCES Consultants will further develop the concepts for Kaeng Yui and seek agreement from the local authorities and local community.

<u>Subproject V3: Western Loop Rural Access Road and Bridge Improvements.</u> No activities are planned for this period.

Subproject V4: Vang Vieng Urban Renewal. No activities are planned for this period.

<u>Subproject V5: Vang Vieng Solid Waste Management Improvements.</u> During the next quarter, it will be critical to agree on the process for continuing to compact waste and utilise intermediate cover, which will reduce leachate production. In the absence of procurement of critical landfill equipment (e.g., bulldozer), consultants will seek to find ways of involving UDAA alongside the contractor in the management of cell 5. This may involve identifying and training a UDAA operator for the bulldozer. Consultants will also work with the local waste collector and UDAA to find ways to improve the safety of operations undertaken by the informal waste pickers. A solution to the management of high volumes of leachate will need to be found since leachate production is likely to be high in this wet season. Further work will be undertaken to develop collaboration with GGGI and other development partners. The PPP arrangements for the management of the materials recovery facility and hazardous waste facilities, as well as the workshop, will be progressed.

12. Issues and Recommendations

As mentioned, EA and ADB agreed during the Midterm Review that package W03a: Vang Vieng Urban Renewal would be on hold until physical completion of contracts TIIGP2-LAO-W02 and TIIGP2-LAO-W03 were 50%. As reported, this is now the case and planning for W03a has re-started aiming for an issuance of an invitation for bids by October 2023, contract award by April 2024 and commencement of works by July 2024 (see timeline below). To achieve this, agreement on revised scope and land acquisition and resettlement impacts and mitigation measures is urgently needed, as well as processing of a one-year project extension need to complete this subproject. The EA therefore requests ADB to support the quick preparation and approval of a social safeguards due diligence report, and implementation of the recommendations made in this plan so that the target IFB issuance in October 2023 can be achieved, and approval of the proposed project extension .
